Still Missing out on Free eBooks?

Are you too busy to come to the Library? Don't have a card? Maybe you're not aware that the Library has over 80,000 eBooks available to download to your mobile device. Check out the following collections from our website, http://www.the library.info/tech/ebooksindex.htm:

- 3M Cloud Library—a super-easy to download collection of bestseller and popular eBooks to check out on your tablet or smartphone. It works with PCs, iPads, NOOKs, and Androids, allowing you to download directly to your personal devices. It does not work with Kindles.
- Freading—another collection of eBooks with the advantage of having titles which are always available-- no waitlists! It features independent publishers, and includes some bestsellers like The Storied Life of A. J. Fikry by Gabrielle Zevin.
- OverDrive—OverDrive has most of the bestsellers and hottest titles that the publishers are willing to sell to libraries. It works with most tablets, including Kindle Fires, and is the only collection that works with basic Kindle readers.
- Enki— Over 16,000 titles available to download or read online. The Enki Library is hosted by Califa, and is the eBook collection created by libraries, for libraries.
- Axis360-- offers interactive eBooks. Many titles are enhanced by color, video, and audio using the Blio reading app that is also 100% compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). All eBooks include text-to-speech (TTS) for the print-impaired.

It's easy to get a card! Just go to this site and fill out your information: http://marinet.lib.ca.us/screens/selfregmenu.html Then come to the Library with a photo ID and proof of address. Ask the circulation desk to help you set up a PIN and that's it. There's never an overdue fine with an eBook—they just expire at the end of the loan period.
