Teen Lounge





We're very excited to announce our latest resource, **lynda.com**: a leading online training company that helps anyone learn business, technology and creative skills to achieve personal and professional goals.

How does it work? The Library's subscription allows you access from any connected computer, tablet or smart phone by using the browser (the apps cannot be used with the library model.) Follow the link from the Library's "Do Research" page, and use the



filters to search by type for "technology." You can also go directly to http://www.beltiblibrary.org/resource/lyndacom. Use your library card number and PIN to create an account. You must live in the 94920 area and enter from the library's website in order to use the service.

Lynda.com has over 3,000 courses available that include over 130,000 professionally produced video segments, all taught by recognized industry experts. Here a few examples of what is offered:

- Software like AutoCAD, Illustrator, Excel and other Microsoft products, QuickBooks, Photoshop, Final Cut Pro, and much more
- Business topics including Project Management, Career Development, Time Management, Communication Skills, and more
- Web Design software such as Dreamweaver, CSS, WordPress, Adobe, Open Source, JavaScript and more
- Marketing tools like Facebook, Linkedin, Twitter, Pinterest, Analytics, YouTube
