Donations of two-dimensional framed paintings, prints, or posters, and fine art books will be accepted in the library’s Founders Room at these times:





What's It Worth?

askART

Have you ever wondered about the value of fine art works you have in your home or office, or stored in a closet or garage? Do you know anything about the artists who created the pieces?



Now you can do research for free with askART, an online tool used by collectors, gallery owners, appraisers, insurers, and others interested in two and three-dimensional original fine art. With over 300,000 American and international artists included, the database contains biographies, references, and extensive auction records complete with images of the works.

Don't miss this opportunity to learn about your art work. Your friendly reference librarians are happy to help get you started with this easy-to-use tool. AskART must be used in the library.

Discover and Go Museum Passes



MARINet Discover & Go is the Library's go-to place for free and discount passes for up to 50 museums and cultural institutions in the greater Bay Area. Locate the museum you wish to visit, make a reservation and print the pass, all from home. Click on Museum Passes under the Services heading on the Library's home page for more information and for the link to Discover & Go. You will need your library card number and PIN.

The Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco (FAMSF) are not part of the Discover & Go system, but you can get free passes to the de Young and Legion of Honor by visiting the Reference Desk at the library. Each adult living in the 94920 zip code area with a valid library card is entitled to two passes per year. Each pass admits two people. Don't forget the FAMSF Auxiliary's Bouquets to Art show coming up April 5-10 at the de Young.

Print from Anywhere!

What do you do when your printer goes out of commission? **Print from Anywhere**, our brand new service, allows you to send your document straight from your computer, tablet or mobile phone to a library printer. After sending, go to the print release station at the library. Card holders get up to 7 free pages printed per day. Other users pay 10¢ for black and white or 50¢ for color printouts.

If you are printing from a phone or tablet, download the app PrinterOn from the Apple App store or the Google Play Store for Android devices. Once installed, "favorite" the library printers from the Locations menu for future use. Full instructions: <http://www.beltilibrary.org/service/print-anywhere>.

And of course you can also print the "old school" way by using a library computer to access your email, document or file, and printing it on site.


